ARCHER COURT COMPLETE

Hooker Centenary Pty. Ltd. report that Archer Court on Mount Ommaney, is now complete. This is the third of the eleven private courts to be entirely built out by the company.

Named after Thomas Archer, an intrepid Scotsman who explored and pioneered much of Central and Western Queensland, Archer Court's eight luxury residences fittingly reproduce the mood of early Australian colonial architecture, in a haven of unspoiled bushland beauty.

Griffin and Knowlman have designed and built the houses, combining the attractive authenticity of clinker and sand-stocked brick with all the ease of living afforded by excellent planning and the most worthwhile in modern trends and conveniences.

Court living, with each dwelling carefully placed for maximum privacy on its own irregularly-shaped third-of-an-acre, provides a complete opportunity to integrate with the environment.

A contoured private access-road, and unobstructive underground utilities preserve the park-like setting, and allow the general remaining area to be skilfully landscaped to an overall plan harmonious to the whole architectural theme.

This concept of life-style is extremely popular overseas and interstate. Although comparatively new to Queensland, it is proving most attractive to home-seekers here too.

Centenary Project goes Red and Yellow

The Hooker colour scheme on signs, of red flaring to yellow, famous throughout Australia has now been adopted for the Centenary Project and will be used throughout the suburbs of Jindalee, Mt. Ommaney, Jamboree Heights, Westlake and Riverhills.

Historically, this colour scheme was devised by Sir Leslie Hooker, Chairman of the Hooker Corporation when he first went into the real estate business at Maroubra Junction, a south Sydney suburb in 1928. It has even been quipped that this was the greatest of many great decisions which he has made over the subsequent 45 years.

It is certain that the use of these colours has contributed tremendously to the size of Hooker's agency business which now totals \$304,000,000 per annum gross sales and \$324,000,000 per annum valuations on behalf of clients and \$35,000,000 per annum in gross rents collected.

The reason for the change over from the multiplicity of colour schemes so far used on the Centenary Project is that the complexion of the operation has changed over the years from a purely land developmental operation to one of full real estate agency.
